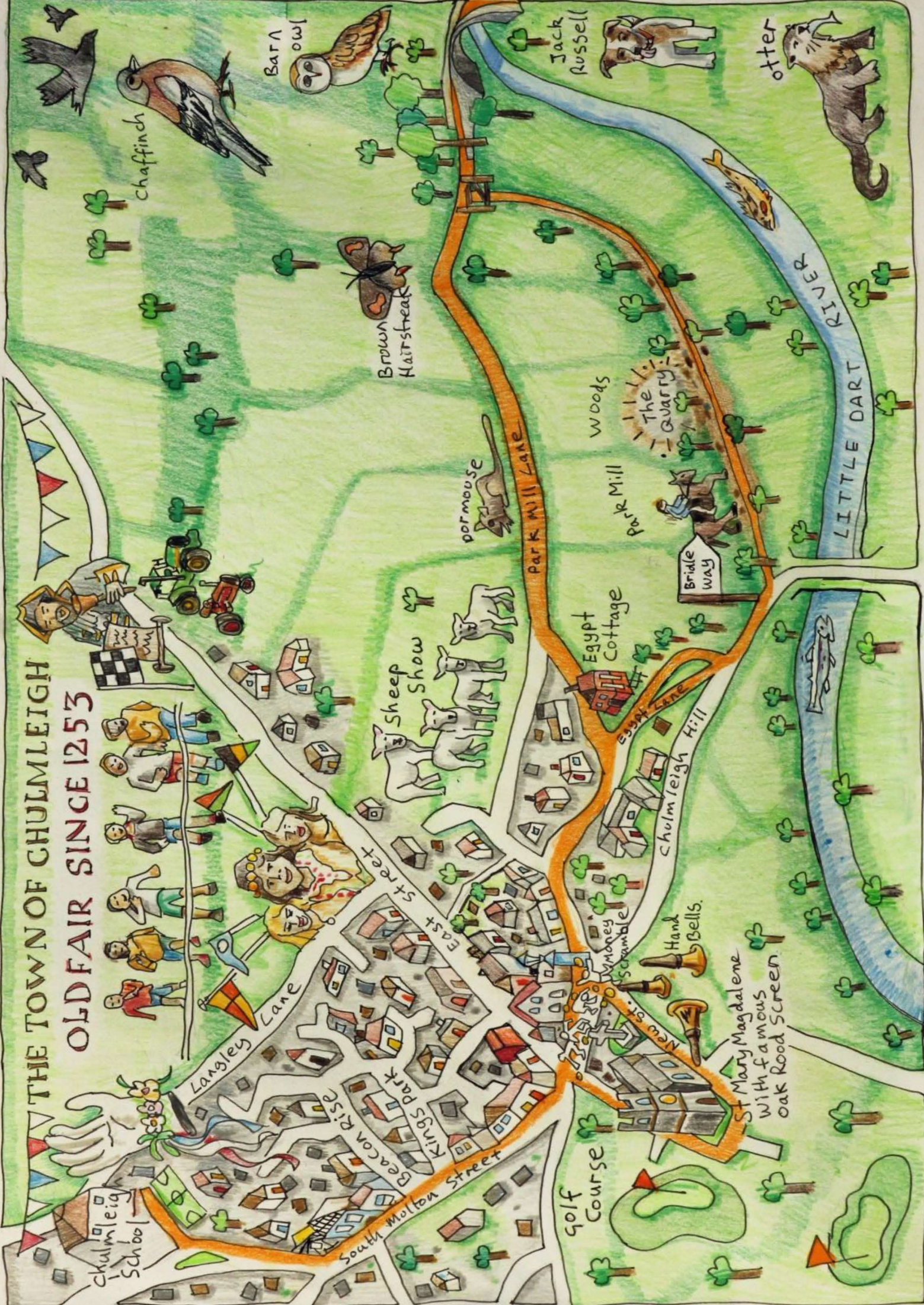

Looking through the eyes of the children from Chulmleigh Primary School, and walking in the footsteps of photographers James Ravilious and Roger Deakins, we invite you to follow our Chulmleigh Community Trail...

The class children of Year Three invite you to explore the footprints of the past and present in Chulmleigh. Look at their work while you walk and learn about the environment through their art and creativity. They have investigated the heritage of the Beaford Archive to create themes such as 'landscape' 'river' and 'trade' for you to explore through this trail. Altogether, there are 10,000 newly digitised photographs, and this trail presents you with a local selection to enjoy as you walk.

Organised by Beaford Arts, the children have worked with Devon Wildlife Trust and resident artists to create this work.

A word from the artists and experts:

Lisa Schneidau, NIA Project Manager for Devon Wildlife Trust:

“The Chulmleigh community trail has prompted new questions for the class about the land surrounding the town. Who made the hedges, and why? What happens when the river floods? When was the quarry worked? We have all learned a great deal about wildlife and local history on this trail. Keep your eyes peeled for the boy and girl holly trees at the top of the hill.”

Kate Harvey, artist and teacher:

“It has been a pleasure working with Year Three and making their archive research and community Points of Interest come to life in colourful (& monochromatic!) ART. Developing layers of past and present scenes from the photographs, and putting the children in the frame as characters helped them think about local history. Working with FabLab to develop 3D printing and use laser cutting technology brought that right into the present to create their 3D community scene. They worked independently, in pairs, and as a whole class to achieve this together: well done everyone.”

“Looking at the archive we have discovered change and continuity, and the great sense of community which exists in the heart of Chulmleigh. To see the children and adults poring over the contact sheets and investigating what was on their doorstep some 40-50 years ago really demonstrated to me how important and rich an archive resource can be to whole curriculum learning. The inquisitive nature of this class is evident in their achievements presented in this trail, with thanks to staff members, and locals, in sharing their knowledge with the children. Please enjoy it, be inspired by it, and we would be delighted if you were to respond to it.”

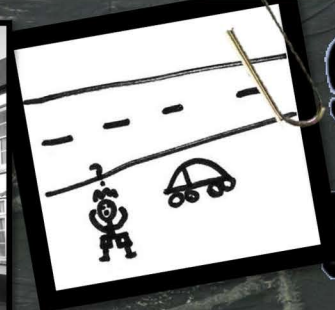

Throughout this project all the children found it interesting trying to classify their photographs and think about artistic composition v documentary photography.

It's our community History,

There's fun for EVERYBODY!

"Every Year since King Henry III's approval in 1253 (granted a Royal Charter), a fair has taken place in Chulmleigh...The Old Fair has survived the centuries and two World WARS. Activities include: Treasure Trail, Quizzes, Six a side football, golf challenge, motor scavenger, medieval mayhem, fancy dress, business window displays, flower festival, the best dressed, stalls, a band and dancers...On the last night there's a massive street party in the middle of the town with music."

The Fair always begins at 6.30pm on the Tuesday evening following 22nd July with a service in the local Parish Church, followed by the raising of the glove at the town hall, the crowning of the fair queen, and the traditional money scramble for the children. The fair ends at midnight on the following Saturday when the glove is taken down.

Did you know?

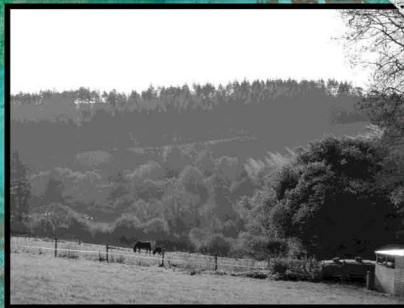
You can tell the difference between a boy holly tree and a girl holly tree. It's very obvious when you know...find out and pass the wisdom on to impress your friends!

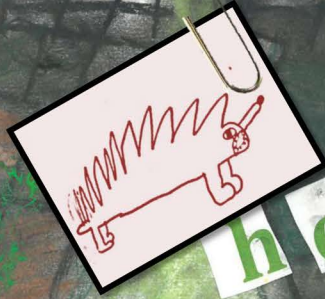

These photographs, taken by James Ravilious, form part of the newly digitised collection of 10,000 images. These have never before been seen due to James ranking them 'Fair' in his categorisation of quality, which is set out from the highest being 'Best' through to 'Good' to 'Fair' to 'Poor'. The children of Chulmleigh thought he was being hard on himself because we discussed the inspiring composition and quality of light that he captured in each. Did you know?
Hedges are one of the most diverse habitats found in Britain. More than 125 threatened species are associated with hedges. More than 80% of our farmland birds rely on hedges for protection and food, and many threatened mammals feed on their fruits and seeds. Hedges help mark field boundaries and prevent soil erosion.

How many Hedge Species can you count?
On this trail, choose a small section of hedge and see how many different species you can count in it. Return there at different times of the year and count again as the seasons change. This is a good way to investigate, explore, and learn about nature in your community.

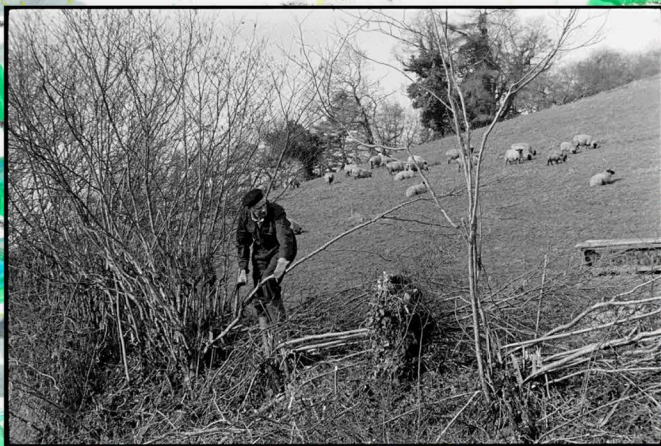

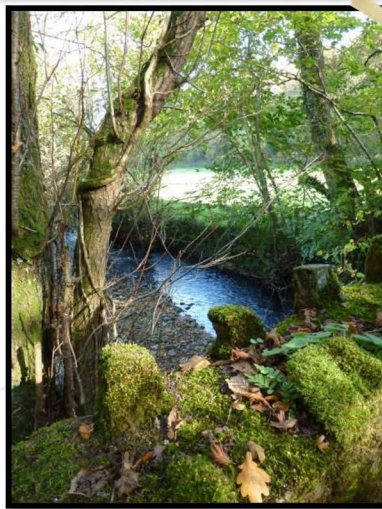


Equisetum (horsetail, snake grass, puzzlegrass) produced through spores rather than seeds is known as a "living fossil" ! (It is the only living genus of the entire class Equisetopsida, which for over one hundred million years was much more diverse and dominated the understory of late Paleozoic forests. Some Equisetopsida were large trees reaching to 30 meters tall!!!)
Look at the map of Chulmleigh to guess where you can find these 'horsetail' plants.



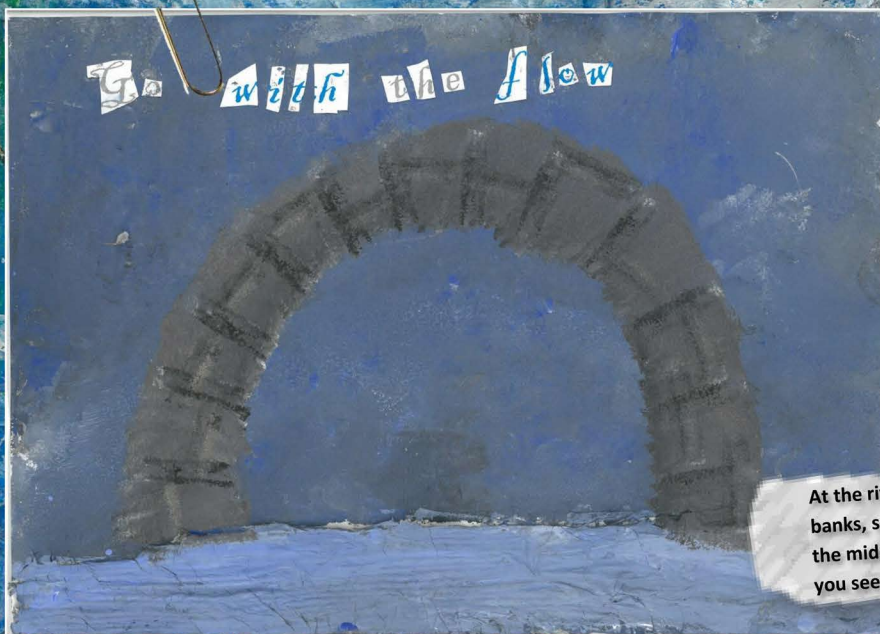
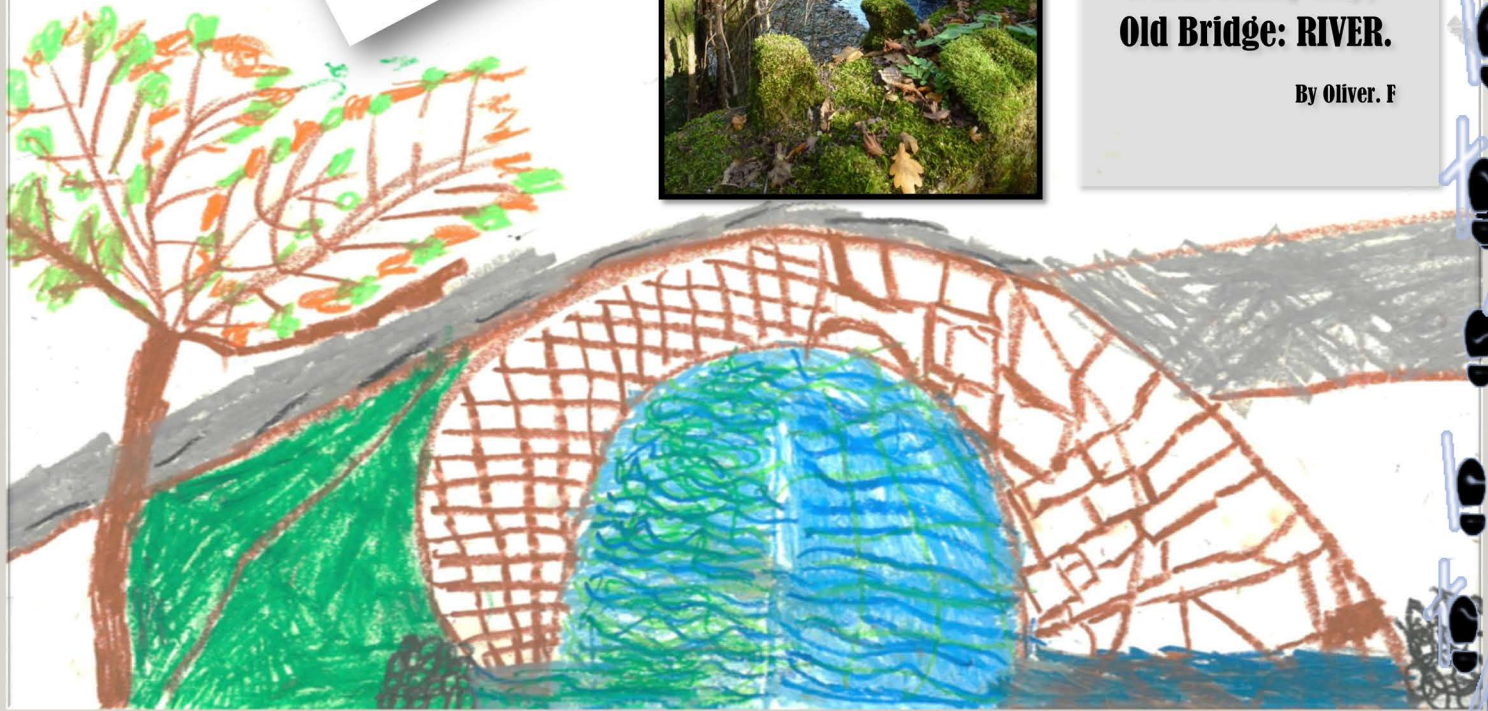

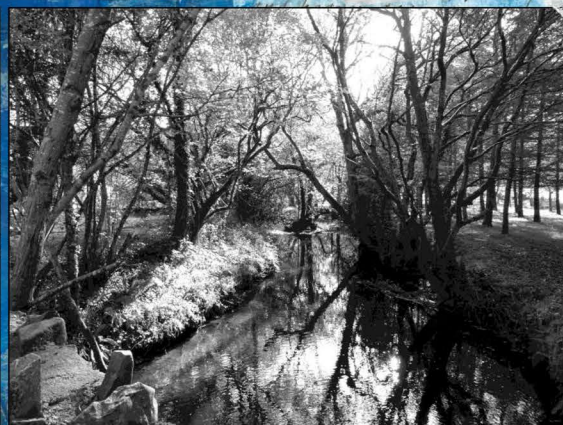
